The Law School dedicated his portrait on June 5, 2019, which hangs in the Faculty and Board room. Nick is the recipient of multiple other honors and awards for his academic and professional work, including the Service Award presented jointly by the Brooklyn Bar Association, the Brooklyn Women's Bar Association, and the Kings County Criminal Lawyers Association; the 2017 "Brooklyn Influencers" list; top ranking in "Government Relations" by Chambers USA from 2012 to 2015; a 2010 Visionary Award from the *Business Week*; recognition as one of D.C.'s "Top Lobbyists" by The Hill from 2008 to 2013; Super Lawyers list by *NYKUG* 2012 to 2015; a Hermes Award for Contribution to Study of Communications from the Syracuse University College of Law; and multiple distinctions from Princeton, including receiving the annual Award for Service to Princeton when he was the president of the 25th reunion class. In 2020 the governing faculty body of Merton College elected Nick as a Bodley Fellow for distinction and service. In 2021 he was appointed as an advisor to Lucy Cavendish College, Cambridge University's newest and Britain's flagship college for access and inclusion. He now serves on the College's foundation.

Nick began his legal career after receiving his BA from Princeton University's School of Public and International Affairs, an MA in Politics, Philosophy and Economics from Oxford University (Rhodes Scholar), and a JD from Yale Law School. He served as a law clerk in San Francisco with Chief United States District Judge Robert F. Peckham and in Washington, D.C. with United States Appellate Judge Patricia M. Wald. Nick worked on Capitol Hill as senior staff for United States Senators Edward M. Kennedy and Daniel Patrick Moynihan.

Nick is recognized by peers and the media as a thought leader in higher education, law, government relations and politics. He frequently appears as a contributor to and is quoted in the world's major news and media outlets in print, on television and radio, and popular online media on a range of topics. He has served on numerous academic boards, taught, and lectured at several graduate schools and universities, and published numerous articles on a broad range of issues, including trends in higher education, internet law, new media, privacy, politics, and lobbying regulation. At BLS he taught Government Advocacy, Privacy Law in a Digital World, and Introduction to Legal Process. Among volunteer civic activities he is a Trustee of Washington D.C.'s Shakespeare Theatre Company, and a Director of Making Every Vote Count, a non-profit nonpartisan organization. Nick has held several leadership roles with the ABA, including its Standing Committee on the Law Library of Congress (2011-present, Chair 2021-), its Communications Committee (Chair, 2019-21), and the ABA Standing Committee on Government Affairs, which represents the profession and law schools before Congress.
